The Needle in the Haystack

Archives hold thousands, sometimes millions of documents! If you don't know the exact location of the records you need, you could end up looking through pages and pages of keyword search results and still not find what you're looking for.

Here are a few tricks the research pros use to search more effectively. Give them a try!

Be sure to click **Clear Search** between each search.

Phrase Searching

Use quotation marks around your search to get results containing those exact words in that order. This is known as *phrase searching*.

Wildcard Searches

The question mark and the asterisk are *wildcards*, symbols that serve as placeholders for any other letter or number. The question mark represents a single character. For example, searching for **gr?y** would return results for both **grey** and **gray**.

The asterisk can specify any number of characters and is usually attached to a root word. For example, searching for **politic*** would return results for **politics**, **political**, **politicians**, and so on).

This a useful tool for broadening searches.
